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# Executive summary

## What is the ANU Indonesia Project?

***The ANU Indonesia Project - Contributing to public policy reform in Indonesia since 1965, through leading research, capacity building and networking.***

Located within the Australian National University's (ANU) College of Asia and the Pacific, the ANU Indonesia Project (the Project) is a leading centre for research, policy development and graduate training on the society and economy of Indonesia. Since 1965, the Project's research and networks have helped promote economic development and improve citizen welfare in Indonesia. It has also helped to build greater understanding between Indonesia and Australia, and fostered deep collaborative links among Indonesian, Australian and other international scholars, students and policy makers.

The Project was initially funded by the College of Asia and the Pacific, and the Arndt-Corden Department of Economics and has received continuing and substantial support from them. Since 1980, the Project has also received generous funding from Australia's Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade (DFAT). Phase V commenced in December 2022 and will end in June 2026.

## What is the aim of the ANU Indonesia Project?

The Project aims to contribute to the creation of stronger research-based public policies in Indonesia by producing and disseminating quality research, conducting public dialogue, building institutional capacity and establishing institutional networks.

## What is the ANU Indonesia Project's approach?

### Conducting research and disseminating findings

Research and research dissemination activities is a core aspect of the Project's approach to contributing to stronger evidence-based public policies and enhancing knowledge on Indonesia. Project academics conduct research on a range of economic, political and social aspects relating to Indonesia's development. The Project disseminates this research, and that of other academics, through government briefings, publications, conferences, and seminars. Relevant activities include briefings for Australian and Indonesian government officials and ministers; the *Bulletin of Indonesian Economic Studies (BIES)*; the Indonesia Update; the High-Level Policy Dialogue (HLPD); the Sadli Lecture; the Mubyarto Public Policy Forum; and Indonesia Study Group (ISG) and Development Studies Forum (Forum Kajian Pembangunan –FKP) seminars.

### Capacity building and institutional networking

The Project also seeks to support the foundations for evidence-based public policy making in Indonesia. It does so by developing the capacity of Indonesian and Australian researchers, by conducting teaching and PhD supervision, offering mentoring through its visitor program and publications, and running training programs. The Project has also created an extensive network of researchers and institutions working on Indonesia around the world and facilitates the exchange of skills and knowledge through people-to-people links. It does so through its grant programs, networking activities and collaboration opportunities.

## Who are the ANU Indonesia Project's target beneficiaries?

The Project has a broad range of target beneficiaries. The Project's target beneficiaries are Ministers and government officials; researchers, academics and students at universities, think-tanks and research institutes; representatives from international organisations, civil society organisations, the private sector and the media; and the general public. In Indonesia the Project tries to ensure that people outside of Java, particularly in lagging regions, can access and participate in Project activities.

## Who did the ANU Indonesia Project work with?

In 2022, the Project comprised 17 core staff and contractors, of whom six were academics. The Project was administered by a fulltime Head and Project Manager. They received support from six part-time thematic advisors, one full-time professional editor and several mostly part-time professional staff or contractors. The Project also received support from 19 Advisory Board members, 24 ANU Associates and 34 Global Associates. See Attachment 2, 3, and 4 for more details.

In delivering its 2022 activities, the Project collaborated with several universities, think-tanks and government institutions and programs, including the following regular collaborators:

## What were the key ANU Indonesia Project achievements?

During 2022, the Project conducted a large number of activities and produced many outputs. Operating on a very small operating budget the Project successfully held 60 events, mentored 9 PhD and Master's students, and awarded two grants.

The Project also conducted, supported and published research on key economic and social issues. The Project's core academics published 18 articles, opinion pieces and working papers, while there were three editions of the *BIES* and one Indonesia Update book published. Core academic staff also provided direct policy advice in several areas, including decentralisations, economic recovery, green economy, renewable energy and economic partnerships.

The Project also maintained and supported a large network of scholars and policy makers, who help to build the foundations of evidence-based policy making in Indonesia. Many of these are former alumni of the Project as well as regular collaborators and participants. In 2022, the Project partnered with 26 organisations to deliver its activities, while over 170 individuals were invited to contribute to or present at Project events.

## How did the ANU Indonesia Project approach gender equity, disability and social inclusion?

The Project aims to ensure all people regardless of gender, race, age or ability have the same opportunity to participate in Project activities. The Project aims to make sure all activities are easily accessible. In addition, where possible, the Project also supports and promotes research on social inclusion and disability. In 2022, there were:

- Two Forum Kajian Pembangunan were on disability: *Smart city model of inclusive and sustainable development* and *Comprehensive and integrated community empowerment in frontier, remote and disadvantaged areas*.

The Project also tries to ensure a good balance of female and male participation in its activities including its grant and visitor programs. The Project also, where possible, encourages research that explores and promotes gender issues. Throughout 2022, the Project continued to foster participation across Project activities and support gender focus research, examples include:

- Eight of 10 Global Seminar speakers were female, while two Global Seminars were on gender: *Gender issues in early childhood education* and *SME development and gender inclusion in Indonesia*.



- Nineteen of the 34 Global Seminar speakers were female. Whilst three Global Seminars were on gender- 'Gender insights from the Covid-19 digital merchant survey'; 'Taaruf online: new spaces for female agency in Indonesian digital/Instagram match-making?'; 'Behind closed-door: gender based violence during the pandemic'.
- Forty-seven of 109 Forum Kajian Pembangunan speakers were female, while nine seminars had a gender focus: *Faux progress: narrowing gender gaps in employment during the onset of COVID-19 in Indonesia; The impact of COVID-19 policy response to women's MSME in Indonesia; The role of MSME actors in increasing households' use of internet; The impact of internet availability to women workforce in Indonesia; Faux progress: narrowing gender gaps in employment during the onset of COVID-19 in Indonesia; Comprehensive and integrated community empowerment in frontier, remote and disadvantaged areas; Smart city model of inclusive and sustainable development; Woman participation in the decision making in agriculture and land and water conservation; and Increasing women's participation in the digital economy.*
- Twenty-one of 24 Indonesia Update speakers were female, while all 13 topics were on gender. See attachment 7 for a full list of topics.
- One of the BIES's Survey of Recent Developments was on gender: *Women's roles in the Indonesian economy during the COVID-19 pandemic: understanding the challenges and opportunities.*

## How did the ANU Indonesia Project engage with the private sector?

Private sector engagement is not a core component of Project activities, however the Project recognises that, in Indonesia, private sector led growth is important and that the private sector plays a role in building sustainable solutions to tackle development challenges. In 2022, there was:

- One discussion with Rimba Makmur Utama/Katingan Mentaya Project about collaborating on a forest restoration project.

- Budy Resosudarmo submitted a research proposal with AXA Mandiri on disaster index-based insurance and farmers’ behaviours.
- One industry workshop: *Halal industries: opportunities and challenges*

# 2022 Activities

## Academic research, teaching and supervision

### Staff publications

The Project's core academic staff published 18 articles, working papers, book chapters and opinion pieces in 2022. Topics included: foreign direct investment; protectionism and trade; education spending mandates; renewable energy; tax systems; and women's economic empowerment.

## Annual public lectures and forums

### Indonesia Update

The Indonesia Update conference is held annually in September. It is one of the largest annual conferences on Indonesia outside of Indonesia. Speakers are invited to write and present papers on selected topics that relate to a key theme of Indonesian development. An Update book is published after each conference, which is the only regular annual international publication devoted to Indonesian affairs.

The 39th Indonesia Update was titled 'Gender equality and diversity in Indonesia: identifying progress and challenges' and was held in-person and online on 16-17 September. The conference was convened by Angie Bexley (Australian National University), Sarah Dong (Australian National University), Diahadi Setyonaluri (Universitas Indonesia).

The conference reflected on the 20 years since the last Indonesia Update on gender, bringing to centre stage gender relations in Indonesia, and presenting an overview of the political, economic, social, and cultural progress and barriers in achieving gender equality and

diversity.

Kathryn Robinson kicked off the first session twenty years after she co-convened the last Indonesia Update focusing on gender. Andy Yentriyani from Komnas Perempuan discussed the recently-passed laws against sexual violence. HE Sri Mulyani Indrawati, Finance Minister of Indonesia, delivered the closing address. Overall, there were 18 presentations by 24 experts (21 of whom were female). The full program can be found at Attachment 7.

Over the two days, 180 people attended in-person. The event was also accessible via Zoom, with 406 unique viewers on the Friday and 202 on the Saturday. In total there were 555 participants on Day 1 (online and in-person) and 330 participants on Day 2 (online and in-person). Participants came from universities, think tanks, government, non-government organisations and the business sector. Of attendees, 63% were women.

By 30 September 2022, the YouTube recordings had generated 1,925 views. The conference was also reported on in media: Policy Forum (5 articles), New Mandala (1 article), Talking Indonesia (1 article) and The Interpreter (1 article).

### Mubyarto Public Policy Forum

The Mubyarto Public Policy Forum is an annual event co-convened with the Faculty of Economics and Business at Gadjah Mada University (UGM). The forum aims to stimulate debate on key development policy issues in Indonesia, especially rural development.

In 2022, the 6th Mubyarto Public Policy Forum was held online on 4 November. Rimawan Pradiptyo (Universitas Gadjah Mada) presented on experimental designs that investigate the deterrence effects of fines on corruption. Arianto Patunru (Australian National University) and Vivi Alatas (Asakreativita) were the discussants.



The event was attended by over 160 people, mostly from Indonesia. The majority of the participants were academics and students, and over half the audience were women.

### **Sadli Lecture**

The Sadli Lecture is an annual event co-convened by the Project and Indonesia's Institute for Economic and Social Research, in the Faculty of Economics and Business, University of Indonesia (LPEM-FEUI). The aim of the lecture is to broaden understanding and stimulate debate about the key economic challenges faced by Indonesia, drawing on the experience of neighbouring countries. It is customary for the paper presented at the Sadli Lecture to also be published in the BIES.

In 2022, the 16th Sadli Lecture was held online on 19 May. The lecture, Competition policy in the age of algorithms: challenges for Indonesia, was delivered by Cassey Lee (ISEAS-Yusof Ishak Institute). Chandra Setiawan (Indonesia Competition Commission/KPPU) was the keynote speaker while Lili Yan Ing (Economic Research Institute for ASEAN and East Asia/ERIA), and Chaikal Nuryakin (LPEM FEB UI) were the discussants.

There were 297 online attendees, with 231 attending via Zoom and 66 via Youtube. Most were researchers and academics (58%), followed by government officials (21%), NGOs (9%) and the private sector (9%). The audience was located mostly in Indonesia and Australia and evenly split by gender.

## **Books and journals**

### ***The Bulletin of Indonesian Economic Studies***

Since its inception in 1965, *The Bulletin of Indonesian Economic Studies* (BIES) has

remained one of the Project's main research outputs. Published three times a year—in April, August and December—*BIES* continues to produce and disseminate high-quality, policy-relevant research on Indonesia's economy and society, as the leading international journal on the country's development.

*BIES* is available in thousands of libraries around the world, through Taylor and Francis and partner agreements. In Jakarta, the Centre for Strategic and International Studies continues to publish and distribute hard copies of *BIES* in Indonesia.

In 2022, the journal's Elsevier CiteScore increased to 3.269, up from 1.552. The CiteScore Tracker also increased to 4.6, up from 3.2 in 2021. In 2022, the journal also ranked 2/87 in area studies, 129/696 in economics and 41/287 in development.

*BIES* published 12 articles, including three instalments of the Survey of Recent Developments series, and six book reviews in 2022. For full details, see Attachment 8.

### **Indonesia Update Book**

The Indonesia Update book (Update Book) is a high-quality record of the presentations from the Indonesia Update and disseminates research to a wide audience in Australia, Indonesia and the international community.

The 2022 book, 'In Sickness and In Health: Diagnosing Indonesia', was based on the 2021 Indonesia Update conference and was edited by Firman Witoelar (Australian National University) and Ariane Utomo (University of Melbourne) (see Attachment 8). The chapters in this volume investigated the challenges and opportunities facing the Indonesian health system and assessed hurdles that Indonesians have to navigate in their quest to achieve a longer and better quality of life. Politics shaping health policy reforms, barriers to supply of specialist doctors and quality medicines, availability of

accurate health and population data, and the financial toll of the COVID-19 pandemic are among the topics discussed in this book.

### Indonesia Update Book Launch

The 2022 Update book launched in Indonesia and online on 31 January 2023 and will be launched in Canberra 22 February 2023.

## Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade

### Briefings

Throughout 2022, Project staff participated in several Government of Australia briefings.

- On 16 February, Blane Lewis provided a briefing to Jakarta Post on decentralisation in Indonesia and Law 1/2022.
- On 23 February, Budy Resosudarmo provided a briefing to Jakarta Post on energy security and disaster insurance in Indonesia.
- On 23 March, Hal Hill provided a briefing to Canberra and Jakarta Post on Covid-19 and Indonesia.
- On 13 May, Budy Resosudarmo and Paul Burke provided a briefing to Canberra and Jakarta Post on energy transformation in Indonesia.
- On 15 June, the Project brought Professor Bambang Brodjonegoro (former Minister of Finance; Minister of Research and Technology; Minister of National Development Planning) to DFAT for a briefing on the prospects of Australia-Indonesia trade-investment partnerships in the digital, telecommunication, energy and infrastructure sectors.
- On 27 July, Arianto Patunru was part of a briefing to Canberra on

energy transitions in Indonesia.

- On 15 September, the Project brought Sarah Dong (Australian National University), Andy Yentriyani (Komnas Perempuan) and Santi Kusumaningrum (Puskapa) to DFAT for a briefing on gender relations in Indonesia.

Throughout 2022, Blane Lewis (Head of the Project) and Kate McLinton (Project Manager) also met regularly with the Assistant Director and Director of DFAT's Indonesia Trade and Economic Section. During these meetings, Project activities and progress was discussed. The Project also met with several areas of DFAT Jakarta including the economic governance section.

## Policy dialogues

### High Level Policy Dialogue

The High Level Policy Dialogue (HLPD) is an annual meeting held in Jakarta each year. The purpose of the meeting is to facilitate informed discussions on major economic policy issues facing Indonesia, as identified by senior officials of the Fiscal Policy Agency in Indonesia's Ministry of Finance. After each HLPD, a communique is prepared for and presented to Indonesia's Ministry of Finance. Over the years, the HLPD has provided high quality advice to five of Indonesia's Ministers of Finance: HE Dr Agus Martowardojo, HE Dr Muhamad Chatib Basri, HE Dr Bambang Brodjonegoro and HE Dr Sri Mulyani Indrawati.

The 2022 HLPD was not held due to COVID-19. However, a pre-HLPD was held on 17 September at the ANU. Discussions focused on the current economic situation in Indonesia as well as potential topics for the 2023 HLPD. Thirty people attended, including HE Sri Mulyani (Minister for Finance).

## **The Indonesian Policy Dialogue**

The Indonesia Policy Dialogue (IPD) is run in conjunction with the Center for Indonesian Policy Studies. Established in 2021, the IPD features a series of public one-on-one conversations with key Indonesian ministers, policy makers and experts on the Indonesian economy. The aim of the series is to shine a spotlight on some of the key policy issues currently facing Indonesia. No IPDs were held in 2022.

## **Regular seminars**

### **Forum Kajian Pembangunan**

The FKP (or Development Studies Program) is co-convened by the Project and various institutions in Indonesia. The seminar series continues to be an important forum for discussing a wide range of topics related to Indonesia's development, and an opportunity to introduce new analytical methods to inform policy making.

In 2022, 38 seminars were held online and in-person. Topics included green energy; disaster resilience; economic recovery; sustainable development; urban development; export diversification; digital economy and women; young farmers; teacher quality; and law reforms. There were 109 speakers, of whom 47 were women, from 55 institutions. There were 22 host organisations.

More than 8,000 participations or views were recorded across Zoom and YouTube, the main platforms used to convene the webinars. Some webinars were extremely well attended, attracting more than 1,500 participants while some attracted 30 people or less. Slightly less than half of those participating were women. The majority of participants were affiliated with a university, think tank, or research agency and government departments. Other participants included staff of NGOs and the business sector.

### **Forum Kajian Pembangunan Roadshow**

A highlight of the FKP series is the FKP Roadshow. The Roadshow recommenced in 2022 after two years on hold. In collaboration with Universitas Syiah Kuala, Universitas Udayana and Universitas Mataram, the Roadshow was held in Denpasar, Bali, on March 1 and in Mataram, Lombok on March 2. The theme of the roadshow was increasing community resilience to disasters in Indonesia. Dr. Saiful Mahdi (Syiah Kuala University) presented a study on the socio-economic perspective of Aceh's post-tsunami experience in 2004. Prof. Budy P. Resosudarmo (The Australian National University) discussed Disaster-Index Insurance which is still rarely studied in Indonesia. Dr I Nyoman Mahaendra Yasa (Udayana University) explained the issues and strategies for Bali's economic recovery during the COVID-19 pandemic. Dr. Diswandi (Mataram University) presented Payment for Ecosystem Services (PES) as an alternative for sustainable tourism development.

The roadshow in Denpasar was attended in-person by approximately 70 participants consisting of undergraduate and postgraduate students and young lecturers. Approximately 230 people attended on Zoom and 160 people on YouTube. The roadshow in Mataram was attended in-person by approximately 45 participants, most of whom were postgraduate students and junior lecturers. Approximately 140 people attended on Zoom and approximately 160 on YouTube.

### **Global Seminar Series**

In response to Covid-19, the Project established the Global Seminar Series to explore policy challenges, public health measures and the impact of the virus on the Indonesian economy, and society more broadly. In December 2021, the series was expanded to include a gender equality



and social inclusion theme, to address topics related to improving access to livelihood access and services for all, including the women, poor and excluded. The online series brings together people and research from around the world in order to broaden understanding and stimulate debate on key challenges faced by Indonesia.

In 2022, 5 seminars were held online. Topics included: energy challenges and climate change; gender issues in early childhood education; SME development and gender inclusion; protecting ecosystems; SMEs and their environmental, social and governance strategy.

In 2022, there were 10 speakers, of whom 8 were women. On average, each seminar was attended by 100 people. Most of the audience were academics, followed with government officials, research institutes/NGOs, the private sector, and the media. Kuki Soejachmoen and Budy Resosudarmo's seminar on 'Indonesia's energy challenges and climate change', was the best attended, with 150 participants.

## Indonesia Study Group

The Indonesia Study Group (ISG) series is the most regular and well attended of all country-specific seminar series at the ANU. The seminars have become a regular contributor to the current discourse on Indonesia's development, and attract an average of 30 participants from ANU; Australian government departments and agencies (such as DFAT and the Office of National Assessments); the Indonesian Embassy, and the public. At each seminar, presenters speak on Indonesia's politics, economics and society.

In 2022, there were 16 seminars held online and in-person. Topics ranged from disaster tourism; underground music scene and Islamic politics; colonial exile in Sri Lanka; Aceh's contested history; women's role in the economy; Indonesia's resource curse, and Jakarta's first stock exchange.

There were 22 speakers, including 10 women. On average, 50 people attended each seminar, and a third of attendees were women. Audience members included academics, students, and government officials.

## Research grant program

### Collaborative Research Grants

Collaborative research grants are awarded on a competitive basis, where proposals are assessed on academic quality, research potential and the prospect for long-term cooperation between Indonesian and Australian institutes. No grants were offered in 2022.

### Student research grants for Honours and Masters students

These grants for Honours and Masters Students assists students who plan to undertake research or are currently undertaking research for which they will benefit from funding to support their research activities. In 2022, two awards were granted:

- Hector Warren Fraser (Australian National University). Research topic: From monuments to replica: ideology and symbolism in Jakarta from Soekarno's Guided Democracy to Suharto's New Order.
- Laura Wallace (RMIT). Research topic: Sexual and reproductive health information access, sources and information-seeking behaviour amongst Indonesian young adults.

#### **Ruth Daroesman Graduate Study Grant**

The objective of the Ruth Daroesman Graduate Study Grant is to support a graduate or higher degree research student in their research associated with Indonesia. Funding for this Grant has been provided by the Ruth Daroesman Endowment. In 2022, two awards were granted.

Lila Dwilita Sari (Australian National University) studied the variations of clientelistic politics and how it affects the healthcare services at the sub national level in Indonesia. Nayhat Nuraniyah (Australian National University) studied Islamist mobilisation and state repression in contemporary Indonesia.

### **Support for policy orientated conferences, workshops and briefings**

Each year Project staff provide support to, or participate in various conferences, workshops, trainings and briefings in Australia and Indonesia. Project staff also provide scholarly input to various Ministries and agencies.

During 2022 staff provided nine briefings, seminars or focus group discussions for Government, including hosting a seminar by Dr Andin Hadiyanto (Director General of Treasury, Ministry of Finance), 'Indonesia's macroeconomic and fiscal performance,' and co-hosting a seminar with the Indonesian Embassy and the Organisation

for Islamic Cooperation, 'Halal industries: opportunities and challenges.' The Project also provided one training session for Indonesian academics. Staff also provided resource support on 10 government projects, and participated in 20 conferences, lectures, seminars, and book launches run by other universities and research institutions. See Attachment 15 for details.

### **Visitor program**

## Outreach and promotion

### Communication Strategy and Action Plan

In 2021, the Project engaged Newgate Communications to help design a Communications Strategy and Action Plan to enable the Project to more systematically reach out to a wider audience and improve communications with key strategic partners. The Project engaged a new Communication and Event's Officer in 2022 and began implementing the Strategy and Action plan.

### Online Presence

The Project promotes its activities through a number of channels, namely a website, blog, Facebook, Twitter and YouTube accounts. These channels also capture recordings of events and activity proceedings. The Project also utilises a number of mailing lists, in order to inform its followers of upcoming events and promote its activities. The Project's resources are gaining popularity as teaching resources for Indonesian academics, and older posts and videos are still generating hundreds of new views.

In 2022 the Project's COVID-19 website received more than 2,000 visits from over 1,800 unique visitors, with the majority of people coming from Indonesia, United States, Australia, and the Philippines. The Project's blog received more than 7,000 visits from over 5,700 unique visitors, with the majority of people coming from Indonesia, Australia, United States and Singapore.

In 2022 the Project's YouTube channel continued to gain attention. 510 new people subscribed during 2022, bringing the total number of subscribers to 5,412. During 2022, the site received 33,304 views. The most popular video uploading in 2022 was 'Day

1-Indonesia Update. Gender and Equality in Indonesia' which received 1,216 views. The second and third most popular videos were 'FKP -Dampak IKN Nusantara terhadap ekonomi regional dan sistem perbankan di Indonesia' (1,100 views) and 'Day 2-Indonesia Update. Gender and Equality in Indonesia' (967 views).

The Project's social media platforms also continued to gain subscribers and followers. The Project's Facebook page received 2,314 visits and 213 new followers, bringing total followers to over 6,880 people from Indonesia, Australia and the United States. It reached more than 130,000 people during 2022.

The Project's Instagram profile received over 2,300 visits and gained 445 new followers, bringing its total followers to over 930 people from Indonesia, Australia and United States. It reached almost 15,000 people during 2022.

The Project's Twitter account received over 1,500 new followers bringing the number of followers to 9,871 followers in 2022.

The BIES Facebook page has over 2,000 followers, whilst the BIES Twitter account received over 300 new followers, bringing the total to 3,084 followers in 2022.

The Project's mailing list in 2022 stood at over 6,868 subscribers.

# Concluding Remarks

## Looking back on 2022

2022 was a noteworthy year for the project. While continuing to deliver its broad range of activities using online platforms introduced during the pandemic, the Project was also able to enjoy a return to face-to-face engagement for key activities such as the 39th annual Indonesia Update.

In 2022 the Project implemented the Gender Equality, Diversity and Social Inclusion strategy developed in 2021. The implementation of this strategy resulted in a greater gender balance participation in Project events and the encouragement of research that explores and promotes gender issues.

The Communications and Outreach strategy developed in 2021 was also fully implemented in 2022. With guidance from the newly appointed part time Communications Outreach Officer, Alex Gotts, the social media reach of the Indonesia Project grew substantially in 2022, with growth across all of the Projects digital platforms.

Throughout 2022, the Project's academics continued to conduct, support, and publish research on key economic and social issues and provide direct policy advice in several areas, including decentralisations; economic recovery; green economy; renewable energy; and economic partnerships. This research was complimented by the delivery of over 60 events, engaging with audiences from Ministers and government officials; researchers, academics and students at universities, think-tanks and research institutes; representatives from international organisations, civil society organisations, the private sector; the media; and the general public.

November 2022 brought to a close the interim phase of funding, and December 2022 welcomed the start of Phase V. Project academic and administrative staff remain committed to developing and implementing strategies that allow Phase V funding to sustain the production, dissemination and capacity building of high-quality policy relevant research and activities on the Indonesian economy.
